



In the snow-topped mountains of the Canadian Rockies, Meg and Mitch are living their dream. But when a polar storm hits, tragedy strikes.





A mysterious and suspenseful novel from the bestselling author of The Winter Folly and The Snow Angel.





A woman is found in the wreckage of a landslide, but it emerges that she was already dead before the landslide hit the house. Perez knows he must find out who she was, and how she died.





Poetic and unflinching, this is a long-awaited memoir from one of Canada's most distinguished literary elders.



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




This novel in short stories traces Cassie's life from ages seven through seventeen when she leaves home for art school and discovers the transformative power of art.





This book is a first person account of a massive Ischemic stroke to the brain stem. Smith takes the reader inside the experience and shows how recuperation happens.





When one day Ian is called by an attorney, claiming the his father has recently died and named Ian in his will, he's confused. Assuming his father has died years ago, Ian goes to the lawyer's office where he is given three items: a key, a deed to his grandfather's old butcher shop, and a letter from his long-gone father that reads simply and cryptically: "Sorry for everything, son, but it's your burden now."

From one of America's most important writers, Perfume River is an exquisite novel that examines family ties and the legacy of the Vietnam War through the portrait of a single North Florida family.




Bandit by Molly Brodak – Grove Press/Black Cat – 978-0-80212-563-7 – PB - \$23.50 – 240 pp.- October 2016


